CONVERSATION PREPARATION CHECKLIST
Before scheduling a conversation:
LOGISTICS
☐ Choose appropriate timing (not during crisis or celebration) ☐ Select comfortable, private location ☐ Decide format: ☐ Family meeting ☐ One-on-one ☐ Written communication ☐ Determine if professional facilitator would help ☐ Estimate time needed (allow at least 1-2 hours for comprehensive discussion) ☐ Send advance notice so family can mentally prepare
MATERIALS TO GATHER

□ Summary of key information to share □ Copies of relevant documents (if sharing) □ Contact information for professionals (attorney, financial advisor) □ Written explanation of reasoning (for complex decisions) □ List of questions you anticipate
EMOTIONAL PREPARATION
□ Acknowledged my own discomfort □ Prepared for various reactions (tears, anger, questions, resistance) □ Ready to listen without becoming defensive □ Accepted that not everyone will be pleased □ Reminded myself this is an act of love and responsibility
CONVERSATION STARTER SCRIPTS
Use these opening statements to begin difficult conversations:
FOR ADULT CHILDREN
"I know this feels uncomfortable, but I've been working on estate planning and want to share some information with you. I care about you and want to make things easier when the time comes. Can we talk about this?"
"Now that I'm [age/retired/etc.], I've been organizing important information. I need your help understanding where everything is and what my wishes are. Do you have time this weekend?"
"Something happened to [friend/relative] and their family had no idea where anything was. I don't want that for you. Let me show you where my important documents are."
FOR AGING PARENTS

"Mom/Dad, I want to make sure I can help you if something happens. Can we talk about where your important documents are and what you'd want me to know?"

"I've been doing my own estate planning and it made me realize I don't know about yours. Would you be willing to share some basic information so I can help if needed?"

"I'm not trying to pry, but I care about you and want to respect your wishes. Can you help me understand what you'd want for medical care if you couldn't speak for yourself?"

IF ADDRESSING BLENDED FAMILY SITUATIONS

Key points to communicate:
IF FAMILY MEMBERS DISAGREE WITH MY PLANS
My response strategy:
\square I will listen to concerns with genuine openness \square I will evaluate whether changes are warranted \square I will stand firm if plans reflect my true values and wishes \square I will reframe as my decision to make \square I will acknowledge their feelings without changing plans
Phrases to use:
• "I hear your concern. Help me understand your perspective."
• "I appreciate your input. I'll think about what you've said."
• "I understand this isn't what you would do, but it reflects my values."
• "These are my assets and I've made decisions based on my wishes and circumstances."

CONVERSATION TIPS & REMINDERS

Professionals family can contact with questions:

DO: \checkmark Acknowledge that this is uncomfortable for everyone \checkmark Focus on care and responsibility, not morbidity \checkmark Listen as much as you speak \checkmark Answer questions honestly \checkmark Allow time for emotions and processing \checkmark Provide written summaries \checkmark Express appreciation for their participation

DON'T: X Apologize for your decisions (unless truly wrong) X Make promises you're not certain you'll keep X Share information impulsively without preparation X Become defensive when questioned X Rush through important topics X Assume one conversation covers everything X Forget to follow up
