

Horse Cremation Urns & Memorial Keepsakes

A Complete Guide for Equine Families

Most families are not prepared for how much ash comes back from equine cremation. A horse returns roughly one cubic inch of ash for every pound of body weight. A 1,000-pound horse returns close to 1,000 cubic inches. Most retail urns hold 200 to 300. This guide exists because nobody prepares you for that moment, and you deserve to make a thoughtful decision instead of a frantic one.

Understanding Your Horse's Ashes

The rule of thumb in the equine cremation industry is approximately one cubic inch of ash per pound of body weight. A 1,000-pound Quarter Horse returns roughly 800 to 1,000 cubic inches. A 1,500-pound Warmblood may return 1,400 to 1,600 cubic inches. The container your cremation provider uses for transport is typically a temporary plastic box, not a permanent urn. Standard pet urns and human cremation urns are not sized for this volume. Human adult urns average 200 cubic inches. Most decorative pet urns are smaller. This is worth knowing before you find yourself holding a container that will not fit the memorial you envisioned.

Three Ways Equine Families Handle the Ashes

There is no single right answer. Many families use a combination of all three paths below.

Path 1: Keep a meaningful portion. Scatter or bury the rest.

This is the most common choice. Fill a decorative urn or a piece of cremation jewelry with a portion of the ashes. Hold a scattering ceremony at a meaningful location for the remainder. Ashes can typically be scattered on private land without restriction, though some municipalities and water bodies have rules worth checking with local authorities.

Path 2: Full in-home or barn display.

Families who want to keep all of the ashes together need an equine-specific vessel. These are not available through standard memorial retailers. Large-capacity equine urn providers are listed in the resources section at the back of this guide.

Path 3: Hold until the right time.

The temporary container from the cremation provider is airtight and safe for long-term storage. There is no urgency to act before you are ready. Many families hold ashes for months or years before choosing a permanent memorial, and that is completely normal.

Your Memorial Options

Cremation Urns

The urns below are appropriate for holding a meaningful portion of your horse's ashes, typically 200 to 300 cubic inches. Each is well-suited for display in a home, barn, or tack room. Cremation Jewelry

Cremation jewelry holds a small portion of ashes inside a pendant, ring, or bracelet. It is one of the most meaningful ways to keep a horse close every day. Custom pieces typically require 3 to 6 weeks for production from the time ashes are received by the maker.

Handcrafted memorial pendants incorporating a small portion of ashes into the piece. Ships internationally. Multiple styles from subtle to statement. Use code MemorialMerits for 6% off. A strong choice for families who want something made with genuine craftsmanship.

Frequently Asked Questions

How much ash does a horse actually produce?

The general rule is approximately one cubic inch of ash per pound of body weight. A 1,000-pound horse typically returns 800 to 1,000 cubic inches. Larger draft breeds may return more. This is significantly greater than what standard pet or human cremation urns are designed to hold, which is why most families end up dividing the ashes.

What do most horse owners actually do with the ashes?

Most keep a portion in a decorative urn or piece of jewelry and scatter the remainder at a meaningful location. Some bury the full ashes at the farm or boarding facility with permission. A smaller number seek out large-capacity equine urns to keep everything together. There is no standard, and all three approaches are equally valid.

Can I legally scatter my horse's ashes?

Scattering on private land you own or have permission to use is generally permitted without restriction. Scattering on public land, national parks, rivers, and coastal waters varies by jurisdiction. Ashes from cremation are sterile and pose no environmental hazard. Contact your local municipality or land management authority if you have questions about a specific site.

What is equine cremation jewelry, and how does it work?

Cremation jewelry holds a small portion of ashes sealed inside a pendant, ring, or bracelet. Some designs use a compartment; others incorporate ashes into glass or resin during production. Custom pieces are made to order and typically take 3 to 6 weeks from the time ashes are received. You only need a very small amount, roughly a teaspoon, for most jewelry makers.

Are there urns actually sized for a horse's ashes?

Most standard urns, including those marketed for large dogs, will not hold the full volume of equine ashes. Urns designed to hold a portion are appropriate and available through the retailers in this guide. If you want to store all of the ashes in one vessel, you will need a specialty equine urn from a provider that builds specifically for this volume. See the resources section at the back of this guide.

What is the difference between private and communal equine cremation?

With private cremation, your horse is cremated individually and all ashes returned belong to your animal only. With communal cremation, multiple animals are cremated together and ashes are not separated or returned. If keeping and identifying the ashes matters to you, confirm in writing with your cremation provider that you are selecting private cremation before the process begins.

How long can ashes stay in the temporary container from the cremation provider?

Ashes are chemically inert and stable indefinitely. The temporary container is safe for long-term storage with no deterioration over time. There is no reason to rush the decision about a permanent memorial. Many families hold ashes for months or years until the right tribute becomes clear to them.

Can more than one family member keep a portion of the ashes?

Yes. Ashes can be divided freely among family members. Cremation jewelry is well-suited for this, allowing multiple people to carry a small portion. Multiple urns, each holding a portion, are also common. If siblings or partners are involved in the decision, discussing this before choosing a single memorial often leads to a more meaningful outcome for everyone.

Getting Started

Most families feel overwhelmed in the days immediately following a horse's passing. These five steps are not a checklist so much as a sequence that keeps your options open until you have had time to grieve and think.

1. Contact your equine cremation provider as early as possible. Confirm whether private or communal cremation is available, and ask for an estimate of ash volume based on your horse's weight.
2. Request that ashes be returned in a clearly labeled, sealed container. Ask your provider what the container looks like and how the ashes will be packaged for transport.
3. Before purchasing an urn, measure or ask for the volume in cubic inches of what you received. Compare that to the capacity listed on any urn you are considering. Capacity is always listed in cubic inches.
4. Decide how much of the ashes you want to keep close versus scatter or bury. You can fill jewelry and an urn from the same portion without committing to a specific decision for the remainder right away.
5. If you want a custom cremation jewelry piece, start that process early. Most pieces take 3 to 6 weeks from the time the maker receives the ashes.

If You Need Full-Volume Storage

If keeping all of your horse's ashes in a single vessel matters to you, the options below specialize in large-capacity equine urns. These are informational references only. Memorial Merits has no affiliate relationship with either provider.

Many equine families work with local potters, woodworkers, or ceramic artists to create a one-of-a-kind vessel. A piece made from barn wood, paddock fencing, or a material with direct connection to the horse often carries deeper meaning than anything available online. Ask at

your tack shop or equine veterinary practice for referrals to local artists who have done this kind of work.
