Is Quicken WillMaker & Trust worth it?

For a straightforward estate, yes. You get attorney-drafted wills, trusts, and powers of attorney for a one-time fee, far less than hiring an attorney. It is less suited to large or complex estates.

How much does it cost?

A one-time purchase across three tiers, with an optional low yearly fee to keep your documents updatable. See the page for current pricing.

Are the documents legally valid?

Yes, when signed correctly. They are drafted by Nolo's attorneys to meet your state's rules. Follow the included signing instructions, usually witnesses and, for some documents, a notary.

Do I still need a lawyer?

Not for a straightforward estate. See an attorney for a large or taxable estate, a special needs trust, a business, or a blended family.

Can I make both a will and a living trust?

Yes. Most complete plans use both: a trust to keep major assets out of probate, and a will to name guardians and catch anything left out.

Is it available in my state?

Every state except Louisiana, and it is not available in U.S. territories.
